### Statement of Faith

I place my hope in a God who created, recreates and sustains Life. In a parent displacing a family in search of a safer life, the regenerated nerves of a stroke survivor who I visit in the hospital, and the joy of watching my children run on a lacrosse field, I marvel at the courage, vitality, and joy of human life created in the image of God.

I place my hope in Jesus the Christ, fully God and fully human, who models how we are to love God and our neighbor as ourselves. In His death, we are shown the extremes to which human beings will go to destroy God's presence in their very midst. When Jesus walked out of the tomb, we were assured death is not the ending of life, but rather that there is no place we can go, and nothing we can do, that God cannot restore us to new life.

I place my hope in the Holy Spirit who Jesus called the teacher, comforter and guide to truth. As we open our spirit to the Holy Spirit, we move in sync with all that is holy in our world. We can be stirred to an awareness of our own calling and inspired to proclaim the gospel: the good news of the reality, teachings and promises of Jesus Christ. Through shouts and whispers, the Spirit unites believers in a vision of peace and justice for all.

I place my hope in the Church as the place where all are welcomed to train and to prepare to become the body of Christ - the heart that feels the pain of the marginalized, the ears that discern the stories of hope in an often hopeless world, the hands that extend peace to the anxious, the feet that stand firmly before those who propagate injustice, and the mouths that teach the laws and parables of God.

I place my hope in the sacraments that ask us to walk in Jesus' footsteps as we are baptized and to begin our journey towards righteousness as we find our place around the Passover table alongside the disciples. As infants are baptized, we affirm the belief we belong to God long before we have the capacity to grasp or act on this truth. As we pass the cup and the bread, we are reminded to make a place for all whom Jesus extended his touch and compassion: the stranger and the sinner, the broken and the afflicted, the powerful and the powerless.

I place my hope in scripture which chronicles the power of God's recreating love, the call of living our lives for Christ, and the revelation of the movements of the Spirit in our world.

As I seek to serve Jesus Christ and the Church, I place my hope in His promise to extend gifts and abilities to all who follow Him and to receive my faults in grace, so that I may love the Lord with all my heart, with all my soul and with all my mind...and to love my neighbor as myself.

## Statement of Faith
